A natural paradise between the beach and the river

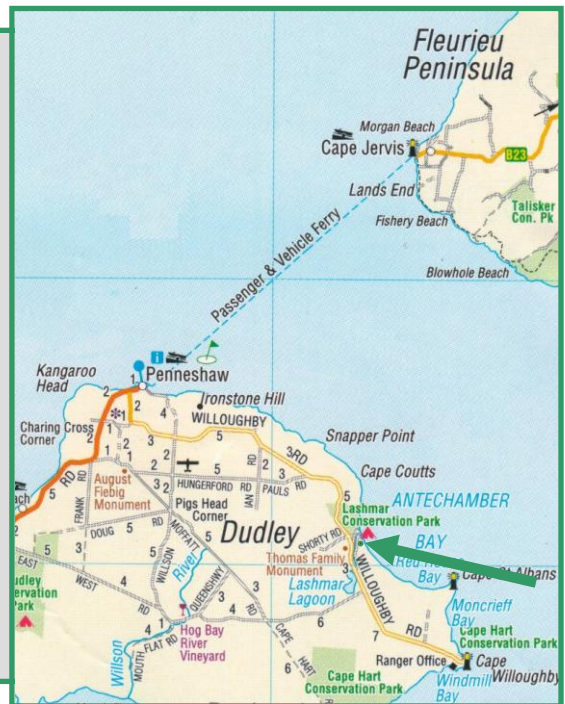
So you're going to stay in the Antechamber Bay Eco-Cabins. A responsible adult should read this brochure before arriving. Here are a few tips to help you have a great holiday:

How do we get there?

On arrival in Penneshaw by ferry, drive through the town and pick up any last minute shopping.

Follow the road out of town, past the KI Tourist Centre (opposite Christmas Cove). Turn left onto the Willoughby Road; sign posted "Cape Willoughby". Follow this road for about 18 kms (12km unsealed). Road conditions can vary so please drive carefully and watch out for wildlife.

Go past the "Antechamber Bay West" sign. Travel down through the causeway for about 1km and turn left at the "Antechamber Bay East" sign. Then turn left at the "Creek Bay Road" sign. Follow this road left until you reach the pine log gate entrance to the Eco-cabins on the right. If you come to the car park at the end of the road you've gone 100m too far.



Where do I collect the cabin key?

The cabin key collection is arranged when you confirm your booking. If you have not arranged to collect a key, phone (08) 8553 1557 or 0428 338 808.

What should I bring to help me make the most of my stay?

You should bring the following items:

- Sheets, blankets, quilts, towels, hand towels (unless otherwise arranged)
- Food/Drink (rainwater is provided)
- Standard Travel First Aid Kit
- Clothing, toiletries, tissues, etc
- Do NOT bring honey onto the Island
- Potatoes must be washed or brushed before brought to the island and must not be sown.

Consider bringing the following for other activities:

- Walking shoes
- Torch for night walks & spare batteries
- Fishing gear for beach and river
- Water equipment (kayaks for hire)
- Games, sporting equipment
- Binoculars, camera
- Beach gear and sunshade

What services will we have access to?

- Telstra NextG phones work on the property, public phone in Penneshaw
- Phone and camera batteries can be charged off fridge 240v outlet, but no other appliances.
- Linen can be provided by prior arrangement, no cleaners, no automatic washing machines
- Large sinks and a clothes line of sorts onsite in Amenities Centre
- AM Radio, stove with grill, bbq, kettle oven, fridge/freezer, running water, cd player, no oven or microwave oven
- Cooking utensils and cutlery/crockery for ten people provided. List available upon request.
- Toilet paper, dishwashing liquid and liquid soap provided (Please use our environmentally friendly liquid soap rather than cake soap)
- Wood is provided, for longer stays you can drive up the track to the wood shelter to restock

What warnings and rules should I know about?



It is your responsibility to make sure you and all of the people staying in the cabin are aware of the following rules and warnings before arrival:

- No open fires are permitted on the property during Fire Ban season (15 October to 30 April)
- You are sharing a natural environment with wild animals and plants. Feel free to observe but do not interfere with them or their habitats.
- No pets are permitted on the property. Venomous snakes and spiders inhabit the property. Generally they will avoid you as you must avoid them. If bitten, immobilise the limb, keep the victim calm ring 000 or 112 on your mobile phone.
- If you intend participating in any water activities, you do so at your own risk. There may be rips out from the beach and although the Chapman River is generally considered safe, you should exercise caution as it is a natural environment. Children should be supervised at all times. Alcohol and water activities do not mix. Using the kayaks for hire means that you must agree to the terms of use and do so at your own risk.
- As a rule please respect other visitors on the property and never exceed walking speed whilst driving on the track.
- Except in designated areas in front of the cabin, always use marked paths to avoid unnecessary erosion. Please do not climb and jump from the sand hills.

Light houses and beacons visible from the beach at night include; Cape Jervis, Cape St Albans and the rocky islands directly East known as The Pages.

In keeping with the true meaning of Eco-Tourism we ask that you help us sustain this facility by completing the Cabin Departure Checklist in each cabin. This helps to reduce the cleaning/travel requirements, which due to the remoteness of the area, also keeps the accommodation price down.

ECO-CABIN FEATURES

<p>Solar Array: 50% funding was received from a DEHR grant for alternative energy. The array consists of 22 panels and 4 batteries with a maximum output of 120 amps. The solar array makes up part of the amenities centre roof. Energy from the sun is collected by the panels and is converted into electricity and stored in the batteries.</p>	<p>Solar hot water: The solar heated water is held in recycled aluminium drums and heavily insulated. Gas backup is available for winter.</p> <p>Self-composting toilets: Australian made Nature Loos. There is a fan powered by the solar array to expel odours. These loos are odourless and we love them!</p>
<p>Low voltage refrigerator: South Australian made Liemack fridge/freezer running on 12 volt power generated by our solar array. The fridge works more efficiently with food and liquid in it.</p>	<p>Rainwater: Rainwater is collected from all buildings on the property and stored in a series of interlinked tanks that share water according to where its required on the property. Please use water sparingly.</p>
<p>Solar lighting: We have low voltage (12 volt) halogen LED and incandescent globes powered by our solar array on the roof of the Amenities Centre that catch free energy from the sun. We collect so much power and our appliances use so little, that lights can be left on during the day without a problem.</p>	<p>Plantation pine: Australian Cyprus pine was used for the building stumps. Cyprus is a natural white ant deterrent.</p> <p>Education: There are plans for informative signs and posters to be displayed in the amenities centre and cabins. There will also be an interpretive walk.</p>
<p>Recycled materials: The plumbing fittings, kitchen area, much of the building wood, windows and frames are all recycled materials.</p>	<p>Structure: Internal walls are structural plywood made from plantation pine, which has insulative properties.</p>
